My dear friends

Well, it's that time of year again when national pride swells, hopes are high and old rivalries surface, yes, the rugby 6 nations tournament is in full swing, reminding me of my late husband, for whom everything stopped when Wales was playing, and the obligatory Welsh shirt was donned and hand on chest and eyes closed as strains of the Welsh National Anthem filled the house, echoed I know in many other houses up and down the country – he, they, I, am proud to be Welsh!



And the beginning of this month, sees our National Day, March 1, St David's Day, Dewi Sant, and many schools on this day would hold Eisteddfods celebrating what Wales do best, amongst them music of one form or another, and they don't call it the 'land of song' for nothing.

Which led me to thinking and reflecting a little, one of the things people have missed most deeply during this pandemic is not being able to sing in church and this isn't just about breaking the spoken word up, but because a song/hymn evokes a mood and emotion, there is a sharedness about it, a connectivity with those who are singing and what or who, is being sung about. It connects and has resonances with, something deep within our hearts and minds, with our inner being and much more besides and lifts us way beyond ourselves.



For some they would like to sing but cannot because the spread of infection is too great, for others, singing is just too painful, physically, mentally or emotionally because of life and circumstances, but for some the song just isn't there because they are fearful, anxious, isolated, only sees blackness what is there to sing about and so there is silence and a longing.

But listen, the song hasn't stopped, but has gone way back to its foundation, the melody on which everything else is built and makes sense, as way beneath the song of clattering and the banging of industry and commerce, the humdrum of daily monotony, the constant rhythmic



ticking of the clock as we race against time, is the earth's song, the sigh as it gently recovers and takes a break, the melodic birdsong, so often drowned out and the slow steady but sure beating of the heart which can beat out the only time we need if only we attune our ears. These are all part of the song that binds each to the other, the song that God the creator put in our hearts, the song we have known since the beginning, the song we know now and will go on knowing and we all have our notes to add, some discordant sometimes but add to the overall melody – 'the sweet silver song of the lark'.

So even at the times when you feel you cannot verbally join in the song, 'Jesus put into our hearts', let your heart automatically feel the beat and rise and respond to it and sing praises of the earth and everything in it and of the God who created it and why and be thankful.

'Sing to the Lord, this new song,' that is an old song, give praise and thank him for the music, for giving it to you and me and endeavour to sing this song, long after the virus has gone.. now after me.. 'la, la, la, la, la, la, la...'

A phone call is easy, but means so much, or a kind gesture, a casserole to warm left on the doorstep, just something, contact – someone cares.



The 4th Sunday in Lent, is Mothering Sunday (14 March) and there will be a service on line to mark this day, via Zoom, when we remember and give thanks for any and all who have nurtured us, cared for and about us, loved us and more besides and we will ensure that all the ladies present receive a small gift of love from us to them, in recognition and thanksgiving for all they have done and still do for us. For more details of the invitation and of the gifts, it will be published in the pew sheets, the weekly mailing (by post or e mail) and subject to the latest Covid regulations. Holy Week and Easter (some tentative plans)

At time of going to press, no one really can say what might happen, or what we might be able to do or not do, especially as it looks likely that many restrictions will still have to be in place but these are some of our hopes for the moment, but they may be liable to change according to up to date regulations and aren't exhaustive by any means.

Palm Sunday (28 March) – there will on line service at 10.30, to mark the beginning of Holy Week, which will feature waving palm branches/crosses and people will either receive them or be encouraged to make their own.

Maundy Thursday (1 April) – there will be a service to mark this holy day, on line which will have a symbolic foot washing and Agapè meal that Jesus shared with his disciples.



Good Friday (2 April) – there will be an observance of the significance of Good Friday, quite reflection of Stations of the Cross in church, at 1.30, Christ dying for us, the sacrifice and the price paid.



Easter Sunday (4 April) – there will be a service outside and on line, celebrating Christ's victory over death the Sunrise at Sunrise on Facebook and a gathering of the faithful later, and the symbol of the egg and chick!

These, of necessity, are a little vague at this present time, and will be dependent on the situation and current guidelines and regulations nearer the time. Annual Parish Church Meetings (APCM)

The first thing you will notice, as we prepare for our Annual Church meeting is the revision of our church or ecclesiastical electoral roll, which enables people to be elected to our church council (PCC), to serve as a Church Warden and to be married or buried in the church. For five years it is revised, that is names are checked and if ok, they stay, names can be removed or added, but in the 6th year, it is completely renewed but thankfully not this year! Because of current Covid restrictions the current roll (only names to comply with UKGDPR) will be pinned on the church door but only for a short time (see details below of closing dates)

In order to be on the church electoral roll you have to be over 16, a regular attender at the church or live in the parish. If you are already on it, you are asked to check your name on the roll when displayed and amend if needs be and then it will be revised and accepted at the upcoming APCM's. If you are not on it but would like to be, then contact Revd Kathy or your Electoral Roll Officer for details of how to complete the form.

This is an opportunity to hear and ask questions about the various activities of the church and organisations, read their reports, see the state of the finances and more and be involved in the plans for the future.


Bryn Offa CE Primary School

One of the things I had been waiting eagerly for were the Lateral Flow Tests provided for school staff. These tests are not quite as reliable as the PCR tests, but they have the advantage of giving a result in half an hour. These arrived on Friday 22nd January and were distributed to staff on the same day, with the first test to be done on Sunday 24th January. I was expecting this to be a bit of a dry run for the testing and reporting procedures, so was quite surprised to be informed on Sunday afternoon that one of the staff had tested positive.



Having this information available to me on Sunday afternoon enabled me to close the bubble from home, with all staff and parents informed within an hour of me receiving the information. This one simple test prevented the staff member from coming into the work next day and potentially spreading the infection. The next ten days in school were the real test to find out if we had caught the infection before it could spread within school. We have now passed this stage without any further infections in the school community, so can be confident we caught it just in time.

We are now back to fifty five children in school spread between five bubbles. All the staff are in and working every day with these children and then also providing the remote learning for the children who are working from home. We have no home working or rota systems due to the number of children we have in school. The question is, when will this change again.



The date has been given of the 8th March as the earliest date that schools can be opened, with the announcement being made two weeks prior to this date. If the children do return on this date, it will be back to the same situation as the Autumn Term, in which all the children were in but kept to their own class bubble.

I am personally looking forward to being able to stand in the hall once more and be able to talk to the whole school. I use this phrase carefully, because without all the children in it isn't really Bryn Offa School yet. When they are all back and all the restrictions are lifted will be a really good day.
