#### **Sofa Club**



Just about 7 years ago, we decided to explore dementia, what it was and is, how it effects people both those living with it and those caring for someone living with it and decided to do some training and subsequently set up Sofa Club. Why sofa, well we wanted to create the impression it was a friendly, welcoming

and accepting space, where people were and are, accepted just the way they are, there are no expectations or to a large extent, rules, it is an informal place and space to simply 'be' where those who come enjoy chat, sharing of ideas, join in worship and simple activity and eat cake! Activities from making and creating, to music, baking and more, it doesn't matter on ability, or even participation, just being present to and with each other. So the sofa is somewhere you might simply rest and be at home, so it is with this group, the tonic sol far brings in the music and how it can connect with people on all kinds of levels in all kinds of situations and we meet on a Thursday, and the poem tells us that Thursday's child has 'so far to go'

Sadly, in 7 years things haven't changed a great deal with regards to dementia, anything to do with mental health people still have a reluctance about, to know about, get involved with and more. It is thought to be a good idea to do something but as long as it doesn't impact me! And so it becomes the unspoken, the hidden, the misunderstood and by implication the isolated almost shameful thing that can bring frustration, impatience, intolerance and more. Yes, thankfully, it is now more in the public domain and is more widely talked about in general terms but I would like to think that the church, our churches can and should, take a lead here. We all know someone living with or we suspect living with, dementia, what do we know, how do we show and share Christian love, fellowship, respect, welcome and acceptance as disciples and within our churches really, not just play lip service to it?

For 7 years our Sofa Club has sought to do that and I hope will continue to do so long into the future, but is that enough? That's the tough question for you and your churches. I leave you with that thought as I hand over the baton to Lizzie Lawrence who will be continuing to write about Sofa Club in our magazine and to plan the activities

The Z team, made up of the lay chairs of the PCC's has met and will now meet regularly as we head into a vacancy and beyond, looking at what they are responsible for and who they work and liaise with,

the churchwardens and PCC, to ensure the continuation of services, maintenance of plant, finances, safeguarding, pastoral care and more,

ensuing a smooth transition from here on in. A meeting of PCC's and the wider community to ascertain wants, desires and needs has either happened or in the pipeline, ensuring that not only are we ready and prepared when this meeting happens and the ongoing running and management of the parishes and the Benefice. I hope that this reassures you and encourages you to look forward with hope and optimism.

# A new resident's perspective.

As a new resident to Morton I am surprised at the lack of interest there is in the lovely church, talking to everyone they all seem to want the church to be there for their weddings, christenings, funerals' and to be buried there, yet no one wants to take an active part in running or maintaining it, I believe that the PCC is looking for a secretary to take minutes of the PCC meetings, and there is a vacancy for a Warden, In my lifetime I have seen many small churches close and then the local community loses its identity, come on Morton, help your church flourish.

Having perhaps read this I ask:

## Do you have an interest of the future of your church?

Whether you are a regular attender, just dip in and out, or have no interest in religion, but like the fact that there is in Church with all its

history and heritage in your locality. As you will by now have heard our Rector is moving on, therefore, there will be changes.

The PCC has now to move on too which, in someways is very challenging and in others exciting. However, without the help of the regular congregation and local people how do they know what are the "needs, wants and desires" of Morton Parish.

To help them prepare for when they meet with the Bishop, Archdeacon's and others from the Diocese and Benefice. There will be an open meeting on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> of March commencing at 10. 45 with a short act of worship (15 mins) following this tea, coffee, Danish pastries and time for you to make your wishes known. No one knows

what the Diocese plans are. The meeting is to get a broader spectrum of opinion of the Parish as a whole. If no one turns up I ask you what are the PCC to do? The ball is rather in your court.

If you are on the Electoral roll of the church, as such you have signed up to be a committed member to St Philip and St James (paid up member) you will be sent a personal invitation to this meeting. I would ask YOU to make every effort to attend or perhaps ask why are you a member? IF you are not on the Electoral roll of the church we would still welcome any thoughts you might have.

At 12.15 the Annual meeting of the church will commence. There is no obligation to stay however, it is open to all.

# NEWS FROM PANT MEMORIAL HALL MARCH 2024

It has been good to see the hall busy even in murky January and February. We've hosted children's parties, a first aid course, an AGM for another group plus our wide range of regulars. Lots of drama (of the best kind!) also going on, with both the LADS and Stage Five using the hall for rehearsals.

The committee are also busy behind the scenes. Our treasurer has been preparing the accounts and next year's budget, our secretary is sorting out maintenance and repairs and of course our booking secretary is dealing with those bookings. The hire fee is a very reasonable £12.50 an hour including utilities – all the info you need is on our website, details at the end of this article.

This year's AGM has been moved to April to give us a lighter evening – so please join us on Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> April at 7pm in the hall for the Annual General Meeting of Pant Memorial Institute. The meeting

usually takes less than an hour – we present our accounts and a SHORT review of the last year. # Tanat to Perry Community Wildlife Group Please help with our Bird Survey, and Save our Curlews

If you would like to do something to help stop Curlew and Lapwing disappearing from the local countryside, we would like your help, please.

We are going to start our bird survey to look for them at the end of March.



lf

you can recognise Lapwing and Curlew (and preferably their calls), you can make an important contribution. If possible, we'd also like you to record Kestrel, Cuckoo, and other target species, but that's an optional extra.

Our area extends from Oswestry in the north to Kinnerley in the south, and eastward from the Welsh border to Ruyton-XI-Towns.

The survey only involves three 3-hour visits, between the beginning of April and mid-June, simple instructions and a map to record your observations are provided, and there will be a training session if you want to come.

Our bird survey is the first stage of the *Save our Curlews* project, as it locates the pairs of Curlews to focus the efforts of the nest-finders. Surveyors are not expected to look for nests.

#### Save our Curlews

There are about 12 breeding pairs of Curlew in our area, We are looking for them all again this year, and we will also be working with Shropshire Ornithological Society's *Save our Curlews* Campaign, which aims to find as many nests as possible, protect them from predation and trampling with an electric fence, then fix a radio tag to the chicks that hatch and track them to see how they use the landscape, and what happens to them. Finding out why breeding productivity is so poor is key to working out an effective conservation plan.
