Pastoral letter written by Paddy Martin-Worship Leader, St Agatha's

There are times when an ability to tell the future would be an asset. At our APCM last year a volunteer to be Lay Chair was needed. Knowing that the main call on such an appointee was to chair a PCC meeting if the incumbent was unable to attend, I volunteered. What I did not do was do my research and now find myself involved with the other Lay Chairs in the work to ensure a smooth interregnum and the decisions to be taken about the future of the benefice!

This month we celebrate the Ascension of Christ to heaven at the end of his earthly ministry. He would still be with his followers by the power of the Holy Spirit but he would no longer be a physical presence. Unlike for the members of the Border Benefice today, wheels were not slowly put in motion to provide a physical equal to slip into His place. Disciples like Peter were faced with becoming leaders of the believers and were tasked with growing and tending his church. Their roles often placed them in physical danger. That the believers were united in faith and love was vital if this young church was to survive.

We lack their experience of having spent a few years listening to and learning from Christ himself but we can rely on him and rejoice with the diocesan authorities in the power of his spirit to help us to find the right way forward if we work together for the good of our parish. Our problems may not include physical danger but ignorance, prejudice, apathy and other human weaknesses may be dangers we must guard against in the coming months.

Christian Aid Week 12–18 May 2024 Will you help someone push back against poverty this Christian Aid Week?



Everyone is equal in the sight of God

For over 75 years, this truth has inspired us to stand together in solidarity with our most marginalised global neighbours, of all faiths and none. Poverty is an outrage against humanity. It robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive.

We seek to eradicate extreme poverty by tackling its root causes. Together with people living in poverty, we amplify our voices to speak truth to power and create lasting change.

- Our work in Africa includes strengthening peace-building in South Sudan, promoting resilient farming in Kenya and challenging inequality in Sierra Leone. We are also working with women to
- increase their access to green and sustainable energy in Burkina Faso, Ethiopia and Malawi.
- In Asia, our programmes include promoting women's rights in Afghanistan, justice and peacebuilding in Myanmar and ensuring people can access the services they need in Bangladesh.
- In Latin America and the Caribbean, we help promote gender justice in the Dominican Republic, El Salvador and Guatemala, peacebuilding in Colombia, and support marginalised communities to adapt their livelihoods to climate change in Honduras, Nicaragua and Haiti.
- Our work in the Middle East includes defending people's rights in Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory, protecting women at risk of violence in Iraq and providing humanitarian assistance to refugees in Lebanon.

How does Christian Aid ensure that funds spent overseas aren't wasted as a result of corruption?

Our money goes directly to our local partners – the people working on the ground – and not to governments. That way, corrupt governments can't misuse our funds.

To ensure our partners aren't corrupt and that our money is spent effectively, we have a detailed process for evaluating partners and projects that is as robust as any system implemented by financial institutions around the world. Whenever we are alerted to a misuse of funds – which is extremely rare – we investigate immediately. If the root causes of the partner's corruption are not addressed, we stop funding it.

How is each £1 of Christian Aid's income used?

Eighty-five pence in every £1 is used for direct charitable purposes. Of this, **32p** supports our long-term development projects, **45p** is spent on humanitarian and emergencies and **8p** on campaigning, advocacy and education.

The remaining **15p** is invested in fundraising. For every **£1** we invest, we secure more than **£6** in return.

NEWS FROM PANT MEMORIAL HALL MAY 2024

We held our 102nd Annual General meeting on Thursday 11th April, moved from March to give lighter evenings. Sadly, we didn't get any public attendance, but we are very happy to welcome a new trustee to the committee. All previous trustees have agreed to continue (and been reelected) but we currently have a vacancy for committee chair. This person will also need to be a trustee – we have a mechanism to elect trustees between AGMs. If you are interested in the role, please email secretary@pantmemorialhall.org.uk or phone 07913 565708.

We're also about to meet up with the parish council to finalise details for a new bus shelter outside the hall, which the council are funding. This will mean that there is a marked and sheltered stopping point for buses in the centre of the village, something that is long overdue and will hopefully encourage bus use. And put the hall as a named place on the bus maps!

We are pleased to be able to confirm that the hall hire fees will stay at £12.50 per hour at least until April 2025. The increase in running costs has been offset by the income from the solar panels, as well as the reduction in energy use due to being able to generate some of our own. The more bookings we have, the more chance of keeping the hire cost stable - so for a local, affordable, modern and spacious venue, please use the hall for your family events, classes, meetings, rehearsals and so on. All the booking information is on our website including our up-to-date availability calendar. You get the whole hall for your booking.

The hall will again be a polling station on May 2^{nd} , this time for the police and crime commissioner election. As always, please ensure that the car park is used only by hall attendees or by those making SHORT stops at the shop. Thank you.

The committee continue to be busy managing bookings, sorting out maintenance and making future plans for the building. We always have a big 'to do' list and welcome help with odd jobs – for example, you don't have to be a trustee to help us repaint the car park lines which is on this summer's list!

Let's hope that by the time you are reading this we will be having some fine weather. It seems ages ago that we had a decent spell of dry weather, when you could have time in the garden without having to dash out and do a few jobs making the most of it before it rained again. I know, the next thing we will be saying is it is too dry and we need the rain.

With the wet weather we have been experiencing, those of us who garden on heavy soils are waiting for the ground to dry out enough so as to be able to

work and feed it. By April/May my compost bin would normally be empty having spread its wonderful contents mainly on the vegetable patch, around fruit bushes and trees and the roses, but as I write this, I have barely touched it. I know with all this wet weather; nutrients will have been leached out of the soil and they will need replacing if plants are going to grow successfully. We should give a thought to the farmers who already are facing many challenges to produce crops and food to feed us, added to which we have had a very wet Spring so far and the impact that that must be having on them. May is one of those busy times in the garden, when everything is looking fresh and lush. If you grow your own plants then by now you will have tender plants hardening off, probably running out of space until ready to plant in their final positions, and hoping there isn't a late frost.

If like the above rhyme, you think garden prices are too high, then on Saturday 18th May the Trefonen garden club will be holding their annual plant sale, where prices are always reasonable and the most desirable plants always sell out fast.
